	Regardless of the route you choose, you are required to complete a minimum of 30 months of relevant practical experience and develop both technical and enabling competencies as per the CPA Competency Map. At least twice a year, you are required to submit experience reports and document a completed meeting with a CPA Mentor to record your progress.

The Professional Standards Board is a national body that reviews applications for membership and administers the certification standard. Once the Professional Standards Board confirms to your PTIA that you are eligible to become a Candidate Member, your PTIA will contact you and invite you to apply to become a Candidate member of their institute.		
	Step 2 : Mentorship. Your mentorship is designed to help you with your professional growth and your development of specific competencies. Your mentorship period will last a minimum of one year and can only begin once you have been accepted as a Candidate Member by your PTIA. This is to ensure that you are exposed to, and cover, a range of professional topics while completing your practical work experience.		

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	Step 3: Logging work experience. The Sponsor, which you indicated on your application form, will monitor you during this stage of the process. Your Sponsor will review and validate (sign off on) your Record of Practical Work Experience (work logs). Your Sponsor's signature on the Record does not merely indicate that s/he believes the work was carried out by you as described, but also indicates that the Sponsor is fully satisfied that the reported work constitutes acceptable responsible professional planning experience."
	 Step 4: Ethics and Professionalism Course. All candidates are required to complete the Ethics & Professionalism Course and Test. The course consists of eight modules and readings: (1) Professions and the Professional Culture (2) Why the Planning Profession is Concerned About Practitioner Ethics (3) Professional Obligations and Responsibilities (4) The Ethical Planning Practitioner (5) The Public Interest (6) Professional (7) Codes of Ethics and Practice (8) Case Studies and Exercises (9) Readings. The candidate has six months to complete the readings and pass the final test
	Step 5: The Professional Examination. The Professional Examination is the final step in achieving your RPP designation. The Professional Examination is a formal, multiple-choice Examination that is offered twice in each year – once in the Spring and once in the Fall. It will be marked, and a "pass" is 80%

All applicants to SDA must pay the \$105 application fee and the appropriate licensing fee. Annual licensing fees (April 1-March 31) are \$330. If you register after October 1, the licensing fee is \$165. If you resign from SDA prior to October 1st, you are eligible for a \$165 refund of your licensing fee. SDA has three categories of licensure which are described in detail under Registration FAQ: 1. Full Practicing 2. Restricted 3. Temporary SDA also has an Honorary Lifetime Membership classification for dietitians who have retired. It is not a licence to practice, but a way of staying connected to the dietetics profession in Saskatchewan. The information requested on this form will be used for the purposes of determining eligibility to be registered and licensed with SDA, administration of the Canadian Dietetic Registration Exam and generally for carrying out SDA's regulatory mandate under the Dietitians Act.

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	This information will be maintained in a database and the names of actively licensed members will appear in a register availably publicly on the SDA website.
	SDA will provide information to eHealth Saskatchewan for their provider registry system to enable Dietitians to be authorized for access to the electronic health record viewer.

	Before you proceed with submitting an application for assessment, be advised that at the current time there are no opportunities for practicum upgrading in the province. Documents must be original and/or notarized translated copies. All original documentation will be returned to the applicant at the conclusion of the assessment process. Please note that missing documents will delay the assessment process. If any documentation was issued under a different name, you will be required to provide official documentation of a name change such as a marriage certificate/divorce decree.
	PART 2- COMPETENCE ASSESSMSENT:
	The competence assessment is a "live/interactive" assessment delivered remotely in partnership with the University of Alberta. The cost is \$600 and it is completed over the course of one day. It is offered twice a year (March and August) and once an applicant has been registered for the assessment, they will receive a study guide which will provide information on what they can expect from the assessment and to assist with preparation.
	The assessment will consist of three parts:
	• Foundational Knowledge Exam- Candidates have 1.5 hours to complete a 100-question multiple choice exam that tests their understanding and application of foundational dietetic knowledge. The exam blueprint is based on the ICDEP entry to practice competencies and includes questions related to biochemistry, food service/management, population health promotion and clinical nutrition.
	• Multiple Mini Interviews- Candidates participate in a series of short interviews. For each interview candidates will have 2 minutes to read the question and 8 minutes to respond. Some responses will be given orally and some in writing. The purpose of the interviews is not to test your nutrition knowledge, but to evaluate some of the other attributes that are important for health care professionals: oral communication skills, critical thinking, ethics, empathy and cultural competence.
	• Practice Competence Evaluation- Candidates have 1 hour to prepare (15 min), conduct (30 min) and document (15 min) their interaction with a simulated patient with a chronic condition (e.g., type 2 diabetes, heart disease) while being observed. The evaluation is intended to test core skills like history taking, data interpretation, clinical reasoning, problem solving, interviewing, communication, and clinical documentation. Candidates are expected to be



	familiar with commonly used Canadian nutrition resources (i.e., Canada's Food Guide, Diabetes Canada).
Required Exams	Canadian Dietetic Registration Exam (CDRE): The CDRE is a four-hour, computerized, multiple-choice examination designed to test practice-based knowledge, application, and critical thinking skills required to competently and safely practice dietetics.



	On the other hand, for example, you do not need to apply and be certified as a Class 1 Operator before you can apply for Class 2, however you must write both Class one (1) and two (2) exams.
	As the criteria for certification changes through the different levels, you may apply for a Class 2 certificate and be approved because approval for the Class 2 would require you to meet the requirements for a Class 1 certificate as well.
